



We give *funding grants* for *research* that

• are led by people with disability



• include people with disability.



Funding grants means money for projects.

Research means we learn more about a topic.



The research we fund helps to make better *policies* about disability.



Policies are documents that say how governments and organisations will do things.



We also support researchers to do better research about disability.

Our aim



We want more research about

• how people with disability live their lives



• things that are important to people with disability



what is hard for people with disability



• what helps people with disability.




Our 2025 research topic

In 2025 we will fund research projects about the safety of people with disability.





Round 1 funding starts in March 2025



These research projects will take 6 to 10 months to do.

There are 2 types of funding.



 Develop a *proposal* to do research about the safety of people with disability in the future.

Proposal means a written plan that says



- what you want to research and why
- what you want to find out
- how you will do the research.




Get key research about the safety of people with disability and write useful reports.

Who can apply for funding in round 1?



We want people and organisations to work together on the research projects.




The teams must choose a

lead organisation to apply.



The lead organisation must have an

Australian Business Number or *ABN*.



An ABN is a number the government gives businesses in Australia.



The lead organisation must also

• follow the rules about disability research



 have clear information for people working on the project



 manage the funding and do the research on time.



We will only give funding for research projects that

 are about the safety of people with disability in Australia



• have not been funded before.



We will only give funding to

• people and organisations in Australia




people and organisations working in teams



 people and organisations who have not broken any rules about research.

Who can be part of the project team?

Project teams can include anyone who will do important work on the project.



people with disability who know about the topic



people who know about policies



 people who work with or support people with disability



 researchers who know how to do projects with people with disability.

How we will choose projects to fund



We will choose projects that will improve the safety of people with disability.



We will think about 5 important things when we choose the projects.



 How the project will lead to changes in policies and in real life.



2. How the project will make things better for people and organisations.



3. How the research will be done.



4. If people in the team have the skills and experience to do the project well.



5. If the project is a good way to use the funding.

Budgets



You can apply for up to \$60,000 for a research project in round 1.


 Read the information on our website with people who might do the project with you.
