We found that most of the research looked at three topics.



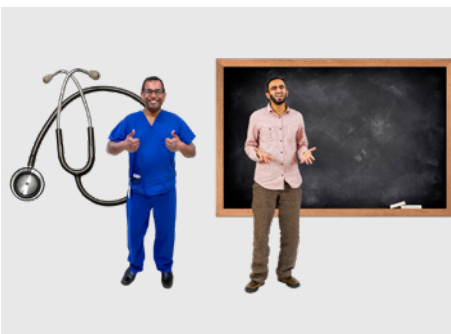
1. The research looked a lot at the lives of people with disability.



2. The research looked at family members and supporters who were not paid.

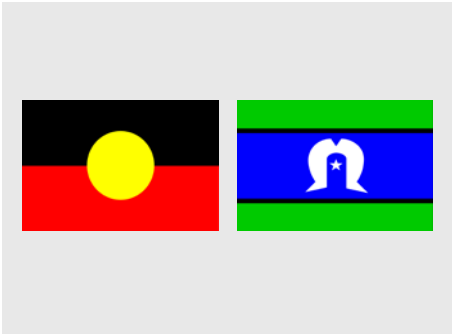


3. The research looked at disability service providers and staff.

- Human rights laws

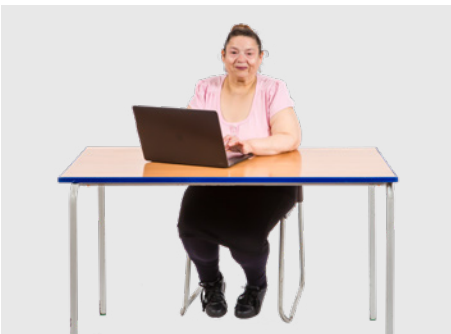
